We're continuing our direct member support, too, and are working with Co-op 108, Green Mountain Spinnery and Pedal People on various projects.

Education Grows: Internship Applications now in Spring and Summer

Last year we instituted a second session of internships at the UMass Co-operative Enterprise Collaborative (UMCEC). Based on the success of our summer internship programming we have opened up the spring semester for students in our Certificate of Co-operative Enterprise.

Interns perform @150 hours of research as well as @150 hours of "on-the-floor" labor. Updates will follow from members.

Education Connects: Our Co-op Certificate Program Draws attention to members, VAWC

During the first week of December, the St. Mary's Co-operative Management Education Program Director visited our area and half our member co-ops.

Through our participation in the UMCEC, VAWC and NFCA had Sonja Novkovic chosen as the speaker for the UMass, Amherst Political Economy Workshop this semester.



Sonja is Professor of Economics at St Mary's University. Her research is in the field of cooperative firms, social economy, and comparative economics. Her first full day in western Massachusetts was spent visiting co-ops from NFCA and VAWC. Sonja, the Chair of the International Co-operative Alliance's Committee on Co-



operative Research, spoke with VAWC members about their challenges and successes to build into the St. Mary's programming and the potential research topics of the ICA.

Her talk involved how membership in co-operatives is more important than ownership, which in itself is not sufficient for co-operation. Likewise that hiring "experts" from outside the co-operative sector can be valuable yet must be coupled with training. The dual nature of co-operatives is unique and forms an integral part of systems like marketing, human and social capital management, education and financial decision making.

Sonja's visit was also a strategic maneuver to draw attention to the

work VAWC and NFCA members are doing to promote co-operative education for our region. We now have a live-wire contact with the only Masters in Co-operative Management in the english speaking world. Our Certificate, the only on-going undergraduate program on co-operatives in the United States, has secured dozens of interns for more than 10 worker and consumer co-operatives.

- Developing our co-operative economy especially with inter-VAWC purchasing and cross sector collaboration.
- Education of many sorts including directing the UMass, Amherst Co-operative Enterprise Collaborative (on Facebook) and the Certificate in Co-operative Enterprise we co-created.
- Operating the **VAWC Interco-operative Development Fund** made from 5% of VAWC Member surplus, owned and controlled by VAWC Members.

Worker co-operatives and our movement are made stronger through shared identity, statutes and structural provisions that preserve our individual autonomy while clearly identifying our organizations as co-operatives united in the common cause of developing a co-operative economy.

Definition

A co-operative is an autonomous association of persons united voluntarily to meet their common economic, social, and cultural needs and aspirations through a jointly-owned and democratically-controlled enterprise.

Values

Co-operatives are based on the values of self-help, self-responsibility, democracy, equality, equity and solidarity. In the tradition of their founders, co-operative members believe in the ethical values of honesty, openness, social responsibility and caring for others.

Principles

The co-operative principles are guidelines by which co-operatives put their values into practice.

- Voluntary and Open Membership
- Democratic Member Control
- Member Economic Participation
- Autonomy and Independence
- Education, Information and Training
- Co-operation among Co-operatives
- Concern for Community

The worker co-operative identity is further detailed by the World Declaration on Co-operative Worker Ownership established by CICOPA (The International Organisation of Industrial, Artisan and Service Producers' Co-operatives) in 2004.

The Valley Alliance of Worker Co-operatives (VAWC) is rooted in the ideals of co-operation, mutuality and solidarity. VAWC is itself an expression of co-operative principles — a “co-op of co-ops” that have come together as a means of strengthening the efforts of our individual co-ops to develop their businesses, serve their members, and contribute to the wider co-operative economy. Our core goal is to provide ourselves with the resources and support we need to advance our co-operatives, empower our members, and benefit more people in our communities.
